# President's Report

It gives me great pleasure to present the NJCA President's Report for the 2023/24 season.

#### Wet Start Didn't Dampen our Passion for Cricket

There is an old saying that *"meteorology is a profession designed to make astrology look reliable"*. This was certainly true of the 2023/24 season.

A hot dry summer had been predicted by the Bureau of Meteorology and consequently we prepared on this basis. However, a wet and mild season ensued.

This didn't dampen our players' enthusiasm and only a few games were washed out.

#### **Strong Registration Growth**

In October 1499 players took to the field including 207 female players. The all-girls competition showed strong growth with a 33% increase in the number of teams. The NJCA has been a leader in the development of our female players and this growth is a positive reflection of years of hard work. We now have young women representing our country who learnt their skills in our junior competitions.

Overall, our player numbers were up 4.9%. Our younger age groups have particularly strong registrations, which reflects both the popularity of our competitions and an overall recovery of junior sport post Covid.

#### **Cricket for Life**

Our role as an Association is to introduce as many kids to our wonderful game as possible and to transition them across to senior cricket with a love of our great game. The data indicates that if we keep players for 2-3 years, there is a strong chance they are a cricketer for life.

#### Bridging the Gap

Blasters and Summer Smash provide the initial introduction for young players, however we see significant player attrition between these offerings and competition cricket. To address this, the NJCA will introduce an under 9s competition on Saturday mornings. As an incentive the NJCA will waive our association fees. Additionally, the Newcastle Coal Infrastructure Group (NCIG) have kindly provided \$5000 to sponsor the competition.

#### **Building Infrastructure**

The season saw our commitment to improved infrastructure bear fruit. The infrastructure levy introduced last season replaced pitches at Pickering and Lewis Ovals as well as to co-fund the replacement of two pitches at Ballast Oval, Stockton and one at Hunter Barnett Field, Windale.

Major works at Smith Park are about to commence. This is due to our successful bid for a \$2.5 million grant for vastly improved amenities including drainage, resurfacing of the ground, and three brand new realigned pitches. The works will mean Smith Park will not be available for use for the next two seasons, we have a separate \$25,000 grant to upgrade Federal Park, Wallsend, as a replacement field over the period.

#### Impact of Basketball Stadium Redevelopment

The NSW government has provided funding to replace the dilapidated basketball stadium with a new facility on the site of Wallarah and Blakely Ovals. It is a state significant development which means the level of government that is financing the project is also the level of government which will either approve or reject the project. For this reason, the project is highly likely to be approved.

This is a great outcome for basketball however it will result in the loss of two cricket grounds in the inner city in an area of strong player growth. The position of the NJCA is that we will not accept any net loss of cricket grounds.

We have been working productively with Newcastle City Council to ensure we have new replacement grounds should the project be approved. We will continue to ensure we are constructive partners with government. An oppositional approach is a risk to junior cricket as it may result in no replacement grounds at all.

#### **Appointment of Director of Coaching**

One of the keys to player retention is a quality player experience. To achieve this, the NJCA has taken the innovative step to create the role of Director of Coaching. The Director of Coaching will work with the club's coaching coordinators to develop training plans for teams and to improve match day experience. This year we will have a particular focus on upskilling our incoming Stage One coaches.

Tommy Anderson has been appointed to this role. Tommy is a Level 3 qualified coach with decades of experience. Welcome to the role Tommy!

#### Afghani Team Take to the Field

Cricket is the second most popular sport in the world and is experiencing rapid growth, particularly in the Asian subcontinent. Days before the competition commenced, we were contacted by a group of young Afghani cricketers who had just arrived in Australia. The boys learnt to play cricket while patiently waiting in camps in Pakistan. Many of their parents were interpreters for our diggers in Afghanistan, risking persecution or worse.

The NJCA found an appropriate competition for them and waived the association fees to enable the team to play. Lake Macquarie Juniors became their home club, and they kindly provided the team with uniforms and kits. The boys had a fantastic season, developing as cricketers and providing a rich cultural experience for their opponents.

#### **Thank You Volunteers**

I would like to extend my sincere thanks to all the volunteers who make our competitions such a wonderful experience. Each week, hundreds of coaches, scorers, umpires, club committees and other volunteers work tirelessly for the benefit of our players.

I would also like to thank the NJCA committee whose expertise and hard work help guide our competitions. There are hundreds of hours of behind the scenes work that occur that our players and parents never see. All of our committee members have other jobs and full lives yet still make the time to improve the playing experience for all of our junior cricketers.

#### Sharon Dare – The Glue that Holds it all Together

Finally, we all owe a massive debt of gratitude to Sharon Dare, our wonderful administrator, whose diligence and passion for cricket ensures the smooth operation of the association. A day rarely goes by without hearing someone praising Sharon's professional and caring approach. I extend our sincere thanks not only on behalf of the NJCA committee but on behalf of everyone involved in junior cricket.

#### 2024/25 – The Best Season Yet

Preparations are well underway for the 2024/25 season, and we look forward to providing fun, excitement and personal growth for our young cricketers for another season.

2024/25 will bring revitalised facilities, new competitions and even more smiling faces than last season!



#### **Registrations & Grades**

There has been a slight but steady increase in participant numbers over the last few seasons, which is pleasing.

Season 2023/24 saw 150 teams from 15 clubs play junior cricket across 23 grades. This is an increase of 13 teams (8.8%) from last season, and an extra 2 grades. Interestingly, overall participant numbers are only up by 4.6%, from 1433 in 2022/23 to 1499 this season. This perhaps suggests fewer players allocated in teams than last year.



Of the 150 teams, 16 were in all girls competitions and 134 in mixed competitions. This is an increase of 33% in the number of teams in the All Girls competitions from last season. Midweek participation dropped this season, with only 7 teams playing in the midweek T20 Social Bash, as compared with 11 last season.

NJCA had 1499 participants this season, of which 207 were females. This is a 10% increase in female participation from season 2022/23, which is fantastic.

Summer smash participation was up slightly from 103 participants last season to 109 this season; an increase of 5.8%. Female participants in Summer Smash dropped significantly, from 23 female participants in 2022/23 to just 10 this season.

After some format changes last season, the competition remained largely the same in 2023/24, with some expansion of the U15-18s and the All-Girls comps. U15-18 Friday Night Premier League expanded to 12 teams, allowing 2 divisions on a Friday night, with division 3 being played on Saturday morning. The Friday Night Premier League was again a mix of 20 over and 40 over cricket, giving these older juniors experience with the longer format as they head into senior cricket. A highlight of the Friday night comp was welcoming a team of Afghani refugees to the NJCA. These boys all had a passion for cricket but none of them had played competition cricket. By all accounts they had a blast and improved along the way. Thanks to Kamran for facilitating the team.

#### Infrastructure

The infrastructure team have been busy this year putting the Infrastructure Levy to good use. Season 2023/24 saw this fund contributing to new wickets at Pickering Oval, Lewis Oval, Hunter Barnett and Ballast 1 & 2.

The major refurbishment of Smith Park is due to begin imminently and will see Smith Park out of action for the whole of season 2024/25. Whilst this will be very inconvenient, the new look Smith Park will be a fantastic facility on completion, that cricket in Newcastle will benefit from for years to come.

#### Summer Smash

Summer Smash is our all-important introduction to 'real' cricket for the younger kids who have either graduated Blasters or are completely new to cricket. It's very popular each season and this season was



no different. It's run in Term 1 for around 7 or 8 weeks. Participants wear all the gear – pads, helmet, gloves – and play modified Stage 1 rules. Summer Smash is run in two hubs - Lake Macquarie and Newcastle. The Lake Macquarie hub grew this season from 4 to 6 teams, so we had to expand from just using Ulinga Ovals, Cardiff South, to also including Feighan 3, Warners Bay. The Newcastle hub saw 10 teams again across the 2 venues, Smith Park and Adamstown Ovals.

#### **Community Officiating Course (junior umpires)**

The NJCA team up with Cricket NSW each year to put keen juniors & willing adults through their Community Officiating Course, which allows them to umpire junior fixtures for the NJCA. This season saw a huge 17 players and parents compete the course, many of whom took to the fields to support our juniors. As always, a massive thank you to Claire Polosak from Cricket NSW for bringing the course to Newcastle.

# Newcastle's 'Celebration of Cricket'

Newcastle's 'Celebration of Cricket' incorporates competitions from across the whole of cricket in the Newcastle Region – juniors and seniors. Easch year, the NJCA host the U11 Ron Arendts Memorial Shield and the U14 Graeme Malcolm Shield, and the Newcastle District Cricket Association (NDCA) host the Summer Bash & Women's T20 Competition.

As has been the case for multiple years now, Newcastle Cricket as a whole was successful in gaining financial support from the City of Newcastle via their sponsorship of the 2023/24 Celebration of Cricket. The NJCA sincerely thanks the City of Newcastle for their financial support as well as their participation in the presentations of the U11 and U14 carnivals. We were very honoured yet again to have Counsellor Winney-Baartz involved in both carnivals in the absence of Lord Mayor Nuatali Nelmes. We look forward to a continued partnership with the City of Newcastle again next season.

### **Under 11 Ron Arendts Memorial Shield**

2024 was the 17<sup>th</sup> U11 Ron Arendts Memorial Shield carnival, which has been going since 2007 (less one year for COVID). This carnival is the only one of its kind, offering hard ball cricket to under 11year-olds. Interest was high again and places were filled in no time, with teams opting to go on a wait list in the hope of a late withdrawal. This year saw the need to restrict each association to only 1 team due to high demand; a great problem to have. The exception to this is of course the host association! NJCA fielded the usual 3 teams: Newcastle boys, Lake Macquarie boys and the U13 Mollie Dive Shield Girls team. There were over 200 participants across 16 teams who travelled from the Illawarra and Far North Coast, and everywhere in between.



The carnival was run over 4 days, with 2 x T20s on day 1 followed by 40 overs matches the following 3 days. We were fairly lucky with the weather this year and managed to get all 320 overs of cricket in. Not so lucky for the presentation though! An untimely massive downpour saw us inundate the Hamilton North Bowling Club with zero notice – huge thanks to the club for accommodating the large group of drowned rats!

The importance of knowing and following the Playing Conditions of each carnival was highlighted at this year's U11 Ron Arendts, where a breach of the playing conditions in a semifinal saw the result overturned. The grand final was contested at Smith Park between our very own Lake Mac Attack and the incredibly polished Manly Warringah JCC. Manly proved too strong for the locals on the day, winning the final 86 (37.5 overs) V 5/88 (17.4 overs). Congratulations to Manly, the 2024 Ron Arendts Memorial Shield winners!

### U14 Graeme Malcolm Shield

Two weeks later the U14 Graeme Malcolm Shield got under way for the 43rd time, having been established in 1982. The lesson learned from last year is that 20 teams is too many, so this year the carnival was reigned back in to the optimal 16 teams. There were still over 200 participants their

families who congregated on the Newcastle LGA to compete in the 4-day carnival. Like the U11 carnival, teams came from the Illawarra to the Far North Coast and everywhere in between.

The format remained unchanged from previous year; 2 x T20s on day 1 followed by 40 over matches on the remaining 3 days. The point of difference for the U14 carnival is the use of turf wickets. Of course, the carnival was interrupted by rain – we couldn't have 2 relatively dry carnivals! – so several matches were played on the synthetic back up grounds due to rain rendering the turf unplayable. Alex Gallagher was the on the ground at the U14 carnival whilst I was away, and he worked extremely hard to get all matches on with as few changes and disruptions as possible across the 4 days – huge thank you to Alex.

In addition to Alex, NJCA also extends its sincere gratitude to the curators and club contacts for their work over the 4 days to get our juniors on turf as much as possible. The carnival utilised 12 turf grounds over the 4 days. As many people in cricket know, turf wickets add significantly to the experience for the players, but with that comes a whole new level of complexity and commitment behind the scenes as well – particularly in the middle of January! So a heartfelt thank you to the curators and club contacts, especially Adam Smith from Hamwicks.

As with the U11 Ron Arendts carnival, the grand final involved one of the NJCA's own – Newcastle Blasters went up against another very polished Manly side, at Townson Oval in Merewether. Again, Manly were too strong for the home side, taking the honours 9-162 (40) V 102 (35.5) to be crowned winners of the 2024 Graeme Malcolm Shield.

# Cricket NSW Community Cricket Experience, Season Review

Sunday 14 April 2024 saw the official end to Season 2023-2024, and just two weeks short of my first year in the Cricket Manager-Newcastle role. First and foremost, I must extend a huge thank you to the Newcastle Junior Cricket Association Committee, particularly President, Andrew Cornwell, and Administrator, Sharon Dare, for their unwavering support throughout the season. Endless thanks must go to every volunteer administrator, committee member, coach, manager, umpire, scorer and parent, whose commitment to our sport is what provides our young players with the opportunity to learn, love, and play Cricket.

Reflecting on all that the NJCA, the 16 Clubs affiliated to the NJCA, and our Cricket NSW team have delivered over Season 2023-2024 is impressive, and testament to the dedication of our volunteers, our clubs, and our wider cricket community across Newcastle.

To wrap up and review Season 2022-2023, Cricket NSW delivered a series of Roadshows across NSW, with the Newcastle event held on 25 May 2023 at Beresfield Bowling Club attended by 46 volunteers, the largest attendance across both regional and metro NSW. Cricket NSW CEO, Lee Germon, presented the State of Play, including a season review, the current CNSW Strategy and the Future of Cricket. Members of the Cricket NSW Community Cricket leadership team, including General Manager, Martin Gleeson, presented information on the Cricket Australia Grassroots Digital Transformation, including a PlayHQ update and next steps, the background and implementation of Cricket Blast 2.0 with key recommendations for clubs and volunteers, and roll out of Cricket NSW's Competition Administration Support Program. Positive feedback from this session highlighted that our volunteers appreciated hearing directly from Lee Germon and senior Cricket NSW staff, understanding the direction of Cricket NSW, and valued the ability to network with other cricket volunteers. The previous season's implementation of PlayHQ and the impact to our volunteers was the most common area of concern raised by those who attended our Roadshows and identified the need for further PlayHQ information sessions to be delivered.

This feedback from our Roadshows led to a series of in-person PlayHQ training sessions delivered across NSW, with Newcastle once again hosting the largest session with over 100 volunteers registering to attend our PlayHQ Community Information Session on 9 October 2023. This session covered high level information for both volunteers and parents, and club and association administrators, and while appreciated, the feedback collected from this session highlighted the need for specific Play HQ e-Scoring training and information sessions. This will be a focus for our local Cricket NSW team in the lead up to Season 2024-2025.

#### **Coach Education & Female Coach Development**

With a focus on upskilling and educating our junior cricket coaches, Cricket NSW facilitated the delivery of 5 CA Community Coach Workshops across the 2023-2024 Season, 1 Community Coach information session, and 3 Cricket Blast Coordinator training sessions. This included a NSW first, with an all-female CA Community Coach Workshop led by accredited CA High Performance Coach, Kate Jackson, supported by coaches from the Cricket NSW Cricket Performance team, Dean Burke, Sarah Aley and Hannah Trethewy, and attended by 44 women and girls. This session led to the formation of the Newcastle Female Coach Collective; a project focused on providing opportunities to develop local female coaches to deliver skill development sessions to female players. This project, supported by



funding from the NSW Office of Sport – She Can Play Grant, has so far delivered 150 hours of face-toface development for 13 female coaches through the delivery of 4 junior cricket coaching clinics. Local CA accredited Representative Coach, Clare Webber, had the chance to engage in 21 hours of leadership development leading the delivery of 3 of our 4 coaching clinics. Across these, 121 junior female players were coached by female coaches, and 45 male junior cricketers were coached by female coaches. This initiative saw our female coaches developing their coaching experience through both practical hands-on coaching of junior cricket coaching sessions, as well as developing experience in planning and designing programs for junior cricketers. In Season 2024-2025 we look forward to continuing the development of our existing female coach cohort and expanding the delivery of coach information, education and accreditation sessions.







#### Cricket Blast

Season 2023-2024 saw Cricket Australia implement a change in our entry level program through a single Woolworth Cricket Blast program designed for 5–10-year-olds. This change aimed to simplify the registration process for parents and carers and focused on providing our cricket blast coordinators and coaches with the theory and practical experience to deliver fun, engaging cricket blast sessions. Starting in August, Cricket Australia launched a nationwide marketing campaign across television, digital marketing and social media, and the National PlayCricket Player Blitz featured our Australian Players and Bluey, following the premiere of the Bluey Cricket episode on ABC TV in June 2023. Girls specific marketing campaigns targeted regions where existing Stage 1 Girls cricket is offered, locally we identified postcodes across Newcastle, Lake Macquarie and Port Stephens.

Newcastle saw 16 Club-run Cricket Blast programs hosted by all NJCA affiliated clubs with 389 Cricket Blast players in our Club delivered programs, an increase from 265 players in 2022-2023.

Across the region, we successfully delivered nine cricket programs via Sporting Schools funding, an Australian Government initiative where schools apply for funding via Sport Australia and can nominate a sport to deliver a sporting program within their school. Across these nine schools' programs, our casual program coordinators provided cricket activities to 1320 primary aged students over the 2023-2024 Season.



#### **Country Blitz**

Over three days, 21-23 August 2023, our region hosted the Cricket NSW Country Blitz, where Breakers player, Sarah Coyte, and Blues opening bat, Ryan Hackney joined our local staff to deliver cricket blast activities to over 550 students at 4 school visits. We hosted two volunteer engagement activities, including a visit to the Charlestown Golf Club Driving Range with junior club presidents or representatives. We also ran a small Beach Blast pilot on Dixon Park beach, where we were visited by Cricket NSW General Manager, Martin Gleeson, and our media team for photo opportunities to be used for future promotions.

#### Infrastructure & Local Government

In September, Cricket NSW attended the City of Newcastle Sports Forum and represented Cricket at the Lake Macquarie City Council Sports Forum for sports organisations. These forums were valuable opportunities for our team to hear updates and information from our local government counterparts, and to present to Lake Macquarie City Council, the direction, current challenges and local opportunities for our sport.

Infrastructure planning continued to feature across the season, our local staff have been supported by our Northern NSW Infrastructure Specialist, Gary Fisher, State Infrastructure Manager, Dean Hunter, and Head of Government Relations and Infrastructure, Erin Todd across several proposed projects and negotiations with our local governments and council staff. We have worked closely with the clubs impacted by the proposed State Significant Development for Newcastle Basketball to build the Hunter Indoor Sports Centre at Broadmeadow. Cricket NSW have represented our cricket community and liaised with the impacted clubs to negotiate proposed replacement grounds for Wallarah and Blackley Ovals, should the project be approved by the State Government. The progress of this project can be followed on the NSW Government Planning Portal https://www.planningportal.nsw.gov.au/major-projects/projects/hunter-indoor-sports-centre-hisc.

At the start of June 2024, the project is sitting at Environmental Impact Statement stage, where advice from all agencies for Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements can be viewed. Cricket NSW will share all updates provided by the State Government portal to our Associations and impacted clubs as we closely follow the progress of this proposed project.

Cricket NSW have focused on building on the existing relationships with our local government colleagues with scheduling regular operational and strategic planning meetings with our own staff, and representatives of our cricket associations. Our goal is to ensure that cricket is represented in constructive and strategic conversation with council staff, and at the forefront of future planning for our sport.

#### **On Ground Experiences – Players and Volunteers**

We were able to share some great on-field experiences with our local clubs and cricket players over the W/BBL and International season. This started with 22 Cricket Blast players from Lake Macquarie, Port Stephens and Newcastle having an on-ground experience at North Sydney Oval for the WBBL Double Header of Scorchers Vs Heat, and Sixers Vs Thunder. Each group of blasters received a themed Cricket Blast shirt and WBBL team cap for the 2 teams and were able greet both teams and players for a cap signing on the field at the start of their bowling innings and participate in on field activities during the innings break. On Sunday 26 November, girls from Cricket Southern Lakes participated in a Lap of Honour at the start of the Sixers Vs Thunder WBBL game at the SCG as part of the WBBL Stadium Series and Women & Girls Week Lap of Honour.

Onto the January test, and on Day 2 of the Sydney Test, Lake Macquarie JCC participated in the onground Cricket Blast Experience where Blast Coordinator Daniel Williams & 11 Blast Players were a part of the on-ground Blast Activation. As part of the Cricket NSW Volunteer Rewards and Engagement Opportunities – over 25 local volunteers from Newcastle visited the SCG during the January Test, including: Rod Unsted, Glen Craik, Steven Cowen, Mark Hickey, Paul Hillier, Chris Lee, Michael Wilkinson, Mel Crimmins, Michael Mooney, Tina Pickering, Naomi Hatton. Engagement Opportunities included: Giant Flags on Day 1 Opening Ceremony & Volunteer Walk Day 4.

#### Cricket NSW Programs, Cricket Blast & Cricket Skills Clinics

Frankie Walsh also sits within the 'Experience' space, where Frankie continues to lead the development of community cricket through data-led analysis and strategy.

In the Retention stream, our Clubs and Competitions Team will focus on the retention of existing players through supporting our associations and clubs is split across Clubs & Competitions Country – led by Daniel Solway, and our Clubs & Competitions Metro team led by Daniel Anderson.

Locally, our Clubs & Competitions Manager for the Newcastle, Hunter and Central Coast region is David Winiata, previously the Cricket Manager – Central Coast. Dave will head our local team of myself, and fellow Cricket Manager / Northern NSW Infrastructure Specialist, Gary Fisher, a new TBA Cricket Manager for Central Coast, and our Competition Coordinator for Newcastle / Hunter, Luke Mace.

The Acquisition space is represented in the Newcastle region by our Blast Specialists Tighan Tosen and Clare Thornley. Tighan manages the delivery of school and CNSW cricket blast programs across Newcastle, Port Stephens and the northern and eastern part of Lake Macquarie, and Clare manages the area on the western side of Lake Macquarie from Toronto down to Wyee. James Wootton has moved into the School Engagement Specialist role, working through a state focused lens to drive a long-term school strategy for all of Cricket NSW.

For the associations and clubs of Newcastle, Lake Macquarie and Port Stephens, direct contacts for Cricket NSW are myself and David, and I look forward to introducing David to our Newcastle Cricket community over the coming weeks and months.

With our newly formed teams, and a successful 2023-2024 behind us, your local Cricket NSW team are committed to planning a bigger and better Season 2024-2025 for our valued volunteers, players, administrators and supporters.

# NJCA Girls Cricket Officer Report

Season 2023-2024 saw 230 girls taking to the field for Newcastle Junior Cricket Association competitions, 58 girls aged 5-10 years participating in club-based Cricket Blast programs, and 165 girls participating in Cricket NSW led funded cricket blast programs and skill development clinics. Overall, 380 individual girls have participated in a junior cricket competition, cricket blast program or cricket skills clinic in Season 2023-2024.

As female participation grows across the Newcastle region, Newcastle Junior Cricket Association is committed to ensuring our cricket offerings provide an environment that will promote female participation. We aim to foster the growth of female participation and provide our young female players with the opportunity to choose a cricket competition offering that best suits their age, level of experience and skill, and most importantly, is the level of competition that THEY chose.

Our Association has borrowed the UK NHS vision of 'No decision about me, without me' to direct decision making around the cricket offerings available for female players. This direction was launched in June 2023 with a Female Player Forum titled Empowerment through Engagement - providing our female players with the opportunity to inform the decisions around junior cricket formats available for girls. The most commonly shared piece of feedback received from the players addressed the all girls competitions, and was that players wanted to play in competitions where individuals were evenly matched in terms of age and skill level. This led to the introduction of two divisions being offered in the Stage 1 Girls and Stage 2 Girls competitions.

#### **Girls Competitions**

In conjunction with the player feedback, NJCA reviewed the age and experience level of all girls registered in the previous season, and created competitions based on this data, with Stage 1 Girls targeting U11 players and offering a Division 1 and 2, and Stage 2 initially being offered as U13 and U15. When registrations were received, further engagement with teams and coaches resulted in a two

division Stage 1 Girls Competition and one single Stage 2 Girls Competition to accommodate girls aged between 12 & 15 years of age. Stage 1 Girls Division 1 - 6 teams Stage 1 Girls Division 2 - 5 teams Stage 2 Girls - 5 teams

165 Girls participated in the Girls Competitions in Season 2023-2024, representing 7 of our Junior affiliated clubs.

The opportunity to play in such a competition, ranging from the quality of the opposition, to the way the games are officiated, right through the ownership the team had to take for its own on field decision making, is something that has accelerated not only the technical ability of each of the players but importantly their cricketing intellect.

Looking back, the three objectives that we set after the first game were certainly achieved. The girls improved every game, played their cricket in a manner they should be very proud of and from all accounts enjoyed themselves and had fun along the way.
